

Texas Ranger Public Safety Education Center



On Saturday, June 12th the museum board hosted an open house of the new Public Safety Education Center and Company "F" Headquarters. The event was planned as a part of the Texas Ranger Association Foundation's Texas Ranger Reunion.

The Education Center is available by reservation to governmental and nonprofit social service agencies for eductional programs focusing on civic responsibility, public service, and safety. More information will be sent to nonprofit organizations in the coming weeks.

The new Headquarters is a regional administrative center for Texas Rangers Company "F." It replaces a 42-year-old building. Pre-planned with room for the future, it has space for up to 11 Texas Rangers and support staff, and is linked to the Education Center.

The event included a tour of the new buildings and a remembrance of education advocate Captain Robert K. Mitchell. Mitchell served as a Texas Ranger from 1967 until 1992. Capt. Mitchell believed in the need to educate the youth of Texas in their heritage and civic responsibilities. Over the years he challenged the Board and staff to make the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame and Museum a vehicle for doing so.

Company "F" Headquarters and the Education Center are a cooperative project of the Texas Department of Public Safety and the City of Waco -- Texas Ranger Hall of Fame and Museum.

The Texas Ranger Hall of Fame and Museum staff is honoring fathers on Sunday, June 20th. Fathers receive free admission with accompanying family member paying full price admission. Regular admission is \$6.00 adults and \$3.00 children ages 6-12. Children ages 5 and younger are free.

Oral History Excerpt

The program is a joint project of the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame and the Texas Ranger Association Foundation. The following is excerpted from an oral history interview with Captain Robert K. Mitchell from 1996. The full interview is available on our <u>website</u>.

ROBERT NIEMAN: What is your official date of joining the DPS, Department of Public Safety? **BOB MITCHELL:** April 1, 1958.

ROBERT NIEMAN: Well when did you decide you wanted to be a Ranger?

BOB MITCHELL: About 1966. Well I had known for a long time that that's what I wanted to do in the long run. But it was about 1966 when I talked N. R. Smith, my Captain, about it. And not only

was he my boss, he was also my friend and we spent a good bit of time together. I expressed my desire to him and he was a great deal of help to me in getting into the Rangers.

ROBERT NIEMAN: ...I'd like to go back to, back when you become a Highway Patrolman what was your starting pay?

BOB MITCHELL: \$320.00 a month. But you know what, in the mid '50's that wasn't a bad thing. You know we made house payments and paid our bills and we ate good and ah.....I was proud to get it.


ROBERT NIEMAN: What about when you joined the Rangers?

BOB MITCHELL: I made about seven hundred and fifty or sixty dollars a month, ten years later.
